Cup Cups may be made of pottery (including porcelain), glass, metal, wood, stone, polystyrene, plastic, lacquerware, or other materials. == Techniques and innovations == aab40d295c Broadly, modern glass container factories are three-part operations: the "batch house", the "hot end", and the "cold end". The batch house handles the raw materials; the hot end handles the manufacture proper—the forehearth, forming machines, and annealing ovens; and the cold end handles the product-inspection and packaging equipment. aab40d295c

Gold glass About 500 pieces of gold glass used in this way have been recovered. Others show portraits of their owners, and the finest are "among the most vivid portraits to survive from Early Christian times. Complete vessels are far rarer. First found in Hellenistic Greece, it is especially characteristic of the Roman glass of the Late Empire in the 3rd and 4th century AD, where the gold decorated roundels of cups and other vessels were often cut out of the piece they had originally decorated

and cemented to the walls of the catacombs of Rome as grave markers for the small recesses where bodies were buried. From the 1st century AD the technique was also used for the gold colour in mosaics. They stare out at us with an extraordinary stern and melancholy intensity". Art Nouveau glass Typically the forms are undulating, sinuous and colorful art, usually inspired by natural forms. Crackled glass vase Art Nouveau glass is fine glass art in the Art Nouveau style. Pieces are generally larger than drinking glasses, and decorative rather than practical, other than for use as vases and lighting fittings; there is little tableware. It was usually made by hand, and was usually colored with metal oxides while in a molten state in a furnace. Prominent makers, from the 1890s onwards, are in France René Lalique, Emile Gallé and the Daum brothers, the American Louis Comfort Tiffany, Christopher Dresser in Scotland and England, and Friedrich Zitzman, Karl Koepping and Max Ritter von Spaun in Germany. Art Nouveau glass included decorative objects, vases, lamps, and stained glass windows. the glass is fused creating a hollow object that can have thick or thin walls depending on the thickness of the pate de verre layers aab40d295c

Roman glass Roman glass production developed from Hellenistic technical traditions, initially concentrating on the production of intensely coloured cast glass vessels. Glassblowing allowed glass workers to produce vessels with considerably thinner walls Roman glass objects have been recovered across the Roman Empire in domestic, industrial and funerary contexts. glass production had been introduced during the 1st century AD. Glass was used primarily for the production of vessels, although mosaic tiles and window glass were also produced aab40d295c

Container glass has a lower magnesium oxide and sodium oxide content than flat glass, and a higher silica, calcium oxide, and aluminum oxide content. Its higher content of water-insoluble oxides imparts slightly higher chemical durability against water, which is required for storage of beverages and food. aab40d295c Various different techniques may sometimes also be described as "gold glass".

aab40d295c The glass was invented by Otto Schott in 1884 in Jena, Germany, where he had established Schott AG with Ernst Abbe and Carl Zeiss. Jena glass is a borosilicate which, in early manufacture, contained added aluminium, magnesium, sodium, and zinc. It was a predecessor to other borosilicate glasses which came into wide use in the twentieth century, such as Pyrex. aab40d295c The champagne flute was developed along with other wine stemware in the early 18th century as...

aab40d295c The earliest examples of flute-like glasses date back to the Roman era. In modern times those made at Murano near Venice, being of fine craftsmanship, greatly grew in popularity during the 16th century and were subsequently exported and mimicked in England and the Netherlands. During the late 17th century it was aggressively promoted as "the glass of fashion" by Charles de Saint-Évremond, while he was in exile at the court of Charles II, and its popularity grew as a champagne glass throughout the 18th century in England and France. aab40d295c The history of cups goes back well into prehistory... aab40d295c However, during the 1st century AD the industry underwent rapid technical growth that saw the introduction of glass blowing and the dominance of colourless or 'aqua' glasses. Production of raw glass was undertaken in geographically separate locations to the

working of glass into finished vessels, and by the end of the 1st century AD large scale manufacturing resulted in the establishment of glass as a commonly available material in the Roman world, and one which also had technically very difficult specialized types of luxury glass, which must have been very expensive, and competed with silver and gold as elite tableware. aab40d295c As a material, stained glass is glass that has been coloured by adding metallic salts during its manufacture. It may then be further decorated in various ways. The coloured glass may be crafted into a stained-glass window, in which small pieces of glass are arranged to form patterns or pictures, held together (traditionally) by strips of lead, called comes or calms, and supported by a rigid frame. Painted details and yellow-coloured silver stain are often used to enhance the design. The term stained glass is also applied to enamelled glass in which the colors have been painted onto the glass and then fused to the glass in a kiln. aab40d295c Art Nouveau glass was in large part due to technical innovations that allowed glass to have more and better color, to more lustrous, and to have more unusual forms. Some of these techniques had been used for centuries, but Art Nouveau glass artists greatly expanded the ways they could be used. aab40d295c There are many specific terms for different types of cups in different cultures, many depending on the type of drink they are mostly used for, and the material they are made of; in particular, cups made of glass are mostly called a "glass" in contemporary English. Cups of different styles may be used for different types of liquids or other foodstuffs (e.g, teacups and measuring cups), in different situations (e.g, at water stations or in ceremonies and rituals), or for decoration. aab40d295c

Champagne glass The two most common forms are the flute and coupe, both stemmed; holding the glass by the stem prevents warming the drink. Champagne can also be drunk from a normal wine glass, which allows better appreciation of the flavor, at the expense of accentuating the bubbles less. Originally called a tazza (cup), it first appeared circa 1663, when it was created by Venetian glassmakers employed at a Greenwich glass factory owned by the A champagne glass is stemware designed for champagne and other sparkling wines aab40d295c

Most container glass is soda-lime glass, produced by blowing and pressing techniques, while some laboratory glassware is made from borosilicate glass. aab40d295c The champagne flute (French: flûte à champagne) is a stem glass with either a tall tapered conical shape or elongated slender bowl, generally holding about 180 to 200 ml (6.1 to 6.8 US fl oz) of liquid. aab40d295c
