In the fall of 1871, after having become established in Vienna, Anton Bruckner embarked on a new symphonic project, his fourth, which in less than a year would result in a completed and copied score of nearly 2000 bars. The Symphony No. 2, which was mostly written in the summer of 1872, represents a breakthrough in Bruckner's conception of the symphony. Although Bruckner had been composing sonata-form movements with three distinct themes since he began writing symphonies in 1862, in 1872 he greatly expanded the scope of their presentation and development, and established the framework, which he would use consistently in all of his subsequent symphonic work. Moreover, the Adagio of this symphony is in ABA'B'A" Lied form followed by a coda - the framework which Bruckner would use in his subsequent symphonic work, with exception of the Sixth. f31d438d3a Bruckner began work on the Eighth Symphony in July 1884. Working mainly during the summer vacations from his duties at the University of Vienna and the Vienna Conservatory, the composer had all four movements completed in draft form by August 1885. The orchestration of the work took Bruckner until April 1887 to complete; during this stage of composition, the order of the inner movements was reversed, leaving the Scherzo second and the Adagio as the third movement. f31d438d3a == History == f31d438d3a In the 2018 article "The 20 Greatest Symphonies of all time" from BBC Music Magazine, this symphony is placed at the 20th position. Bruckner also holds the 13th place with Symphony No. 8. f31d438d3a

Symphony No. 6 (Bruckner) 6 in A major, WAB 106, was composed between 24 September 1879, and 3 September 1881 and dedicated to his landlord, Anton van Ölzelt-Newin. Redlich went so far as to cite the lack of hallmarks of Bruckner's symphonic compositional style in the Sixth Symphony for the somewhat bewildered reaction of supporters and critics alike. Though it possesses many characteristic features of a Bruckner symphony, it differs the most from the rest of his symphonic repertory. V. In September 1887, Bruckner had the score copied and sent to conductor Hermann Levi. Levi was one of Bruckner's closest collaborators, having given a performance of the Symphony No. 7 in Munich that was "the greatest triumph Bruckner had yet experienced". He had also arranged for Bruckner's career to be supported... f31d438d3a After completing his military service in 1897, Haack took up a permanent position with Justus Perthes Publishers in Gotha, where he had worked from time to time as a student. The first major project in which Haack was involved was with his former teacher Richard Lüddecke's Deutsche Schulatlas. After his early death in 1888, his task was taken over by Hermann Habenicht.... f31d438d3a The Fifth was first performed in public on two pianos by Joseph Schalk and Franz Zottmann on 20 April 1887 in the Bösendorfersaal in Vienna. The first orchestral performance - in the inauthentic "Schalk version", with a changed orchestration in Wagnerian fashion and omitting 122 bars of the finale - was conducted by Franz Schalk in Graz on 8 April 1894. Bruckner, who died two years later, was sick and unable to attend. He never heard this symphony performed by an orchestra. f31d438d3a The symphony has four movements. Bruckner revised the symphony multiple times and it exists in three major versions. The initial version of 1874 differs in several respects from the other two, most importantly the entirely separate scherzo movement: f31d438d3a By the time Bruckner began composing his Symphony No. 6, only three of his symphonies had been performed. Symphony No. 5 (Bruckner) Dedicated to Karl von Stremayr, education minister in the Austro-Hungarian Empire, the symphony has at times been nicknamed the "Tragic", the "Church of Faith" or the "Pizzicato"; Bruckner himself referred to it as the "Fantastic" without applying this or any other name formally. His father ran a post office in Friedrichswerth. Haack attended the local elementary school from 1878 to 1883. By chance he met Bernhard Perthes, who supported him financially and enabled him to study in Halle, where he started in 1893 to study geography and cartography. Later he moved to the Georg-August-Universität Göttingen, where he became a student of the geographer Hermann Wagner (1840–1929). On his recommendation, Haack was subsequently transferred to Friedrich Wilhelm University Berlin where he became an assistant to Ferdinand von Richthofen. In 1896 Haack successfully completed his studies with his Thesis Über die mittlere Höhe von Süd Amerika (About the middle elevation of South America). f31d438d3a

Symphony No. 2 (Bruckner) 1 in C minor (1866), and the Unnumbered Symphony in D minor (1869). Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra, studio recording, 1973, Decca/London Günter Wand conducting the Cologne Radio Symphony Orchestra, studio recording, 1981, Anton Bruckner's Symphony No. It was actually the fourth symphony composed by Bruckner, after the Symphony in F minor (1863), the Symphony No. 2 in C minor, sometimes known as the "Symphony of Pauses", was completed in 1872 f31d438d3a

Bruckner's F-minor symphony of 1863 was initially designated Symphony No. 1, and, in a letter to his friend Rudolf Weinwurm dated 29 January 1865, Bruckner described the C-minor symphony he was working on at the time as his Symphony No. 2. Later Bruckner decided to leave the F-minor symphony unnumbered, and he called the C-minor symphony of 1865/66 his “Symphony No. 1”. Similarly, the D-minor symphony of 1869 was initially designated Symphony No. 2, while the C-minor symphony of 1872 was his Symphony No. 3. At some time in 1872 or 1873, Bruckner decided to leave the D-minor symphony unnumbered, and he called the C-minor symphony of 1872 his “Symphony No. 2”. f31d438d3a

Symphony No. 7 (Bruckner) It was written between 1881 and 1883 and was revised in 1885. It is dedicated to Ludwig II of Bavaria. 7 in E major, WAB 107, is one of the composer's best-known symphonies. Stephen Johnson prefers Karl Böhm's recording with the Vienna Philharmonic Anton Bruckner's Symphony No. The premiere, given under Arthur Nikisch and the Gewandhaus Orchestra in the opera house at Leipzig on 30 December 1884, brought Bruckner the greatest success he had known in his life. Eugen Jochum in 1976, Bernard Haitink in 1978, Karajan in 1989, and Günter Wand in 1999 f31d438d3a

Symphony No. 1 (Bruckner) 1 in C minor, WAB 101, was the first symphony the composer thought worthy of performing and bequeathing to

the Austrian National Library. (Symphony No.) The composer gave it the nickname Das kecke Beseerl (The Saucy Maid), and conducted its 1868 premiere. 2 in C minor was completed after the "nullified" Symphony in D minor. This symphony is sometimes nicknamed The Apocalyptic, but this was not a name Bruckner gave to the work himself. f31d438d3a According to Albert Speer, the symphony was performed before the fall of Berlin, in a concert on 12 April 1945. Symphony No. 4 (Bruckner) It was dedicated to Prince Konstantin of Hohenlohe-Schillingsfürst. 4 in E♭ major, WAB 104, is one of the composer's most popular works. It was premiered in Vienna in 1881, conducted by Hans Richter in Vienna to great acclaim. It was written in 1874 and revised several times through 1888. Symphony No. 8 (Bruckner) It was premiered under conductor Hans Richter in 1892 at the Musikverein, Vienna. popular: conductors such as Herbert von Karajan, Bernard Haitink and Günter Wand continued to use it even after the Nowak/1890 edition was published, while Anton Bruckner's Symphony No. 8 in C minor, WAB 108, is the last symphony he completed, and is dedicated to Emperor Franz Joseph I of Austria. It exists in two major versions of 1887 and 1890 f31d438d3a

== Historical context == f31d438d3a According to Robert Simpson, though not commonly performed and often thought of as the ugly duckling of Bruckner's symphonic body of work, the symphony nonetheless makes an immediate impression of rich and individual expressiveness: "Its themes are exceptionally beautiful, its harmony has moments of both boldness and subtlety, its instrumentation is the most imaginative he had yet achieved, and it possesses a mastery of classical form that might even have impressed Brahms." f31d438d3a The Second Symphony is the only numbered Bruckner... f31d438d3a Sobekneferu ascended to the throne following the death of Amenemhat IV, her presumed brother and husband, albeit the relationship is unsubstantiated. The reasons for her accession are debated. One possibility is that her predecessor had no male heir to bestow the throne to, thus leaving his sister to take the mantle of king. Yet, there are two candidate sons, Sobekhotep I and Sonbef, that are stated through their filiative nomen to be 'Amenemhat's son'.
