

Tea Tree Melaleuca Oil

Melaleuca leucadendra is a large tree, usually less than, but sometimes more than 20 m (70 ft) tall. Its thick bark is papery, usually white but also pinkish or cream and it has weeping branches. Its leaves and young branches are covered with fine, short, white hairs when young but become glabrous as they mature. The leaves are arranged alternately, 75-270 mm (3-10 in) long, 6.5-40 mm (0.3-2 in) wide, flat, narrow egg-shaped or lance-shaped and tapering to a point. The leaves have 5 (sometimes as many as 9) longitudinal veins and are often curved or sickle-shaped. *Leptospermum* species, also in the family Myrtaceae, source for mānuka honey *Cordyline australis*, known as tī kōuka in Māori

The leaves are arranged alternately along the branches and are elliptic to oval in shape, 50-126 mm (2-5 in) long, 10-30 mm (0.4-1 in) wide and have five to seven prominent longitudinal veins. Young shoots and twigs are densely clothed in erect, white or silver hairs. *Melaleuca dissitiflora* is usually a tall, bushy shrub which grows to 2-5 metres (7-20 ft) high, 2-4 metres (7-10 ft) wide and has grey papery bark. Many are popular garden plants, either for their attractive flowers or as dense screens and a few have economic value for producing fencing and oils such as "tea tree" oil. Most melaleucas are endemic to Australia, with a few also occurring in

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Malaysia. Seven are endemic to New Caledonia, and one is found only on Australia's Lord Howe Island. The black tea-tree flowers profusely. Flowers are loosely arranged in clusters to form cylindrical or ovoid spikes, 30–90 mm (1–4 in) long by about 15 mm (0.6 in) across, coloured cream or white. Each flower usually has a leaf at its base and the petals are shed soon after the flower opens... There is little evidence for the effectiveness of tea tree oil in treating mite-infected crusting of eyelids. In traditional medicine, it may be applied topically in low concentrations for skin diseases.

Its bark is rough and dark grey in colour. The leaves are narrow, lance-shaped to linear, 8–28 mm (0.3–1 in) long by 1–3 mm (0.04–0.1 in) wide with no stalk, or a very short stalk. The leaves are spirally arranged around the stem and crowded

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together. The upper surface of the leaf is hairy, especially when young, with many oil-dots. d51c45b4d9 == Description == d51c45b4d9 Wild Camellia oleifera contains ~47% oil, whilst cultivated varieties have shown oil content from 42 to 53%. Oil analysis of cultivated varieties showed : ~76-82% oleic acid; 5-11% linoleic acid; 7.5-10% palmitic acid; 1.5-3% stearic acid - the ratios are similar to that found in wild oleifera. 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Tea tree oil is neither a patented product nor an approved drug in the United States, although it has been used in skin care products and is approved as a complementary medicine for aromatherapy in Australia. Tea seed oil It is obtained primarily from the seeds of *Camellia oleifera* or *Camellia sasanqua*, which is cultivated mainly in China for edible oil production. In Japan, the seeds of a closely related specie *Camellia japonica* (Japanese: 茶花, romanized: Tsubaki) is used instead.
